



#### A letter from the Churchwardens

Welcome to this magazine. As you are reading this the church, and the parish, of All Saints' is entering a period of vacancy. Whilst the weather outside may be gloriously sunny and warm many of you may be feeling a little more unsettled inside.

As your Churchwardens we are here to help in any way we can during this period. Much consideration has been put into the plans which are in place and will continue to evolve as we search for our new Vicar. The most important aspect of this is that we all work together to use our strengths to help each other during this time. We are drawn to the letter to the Romans chapter 12. ### Farewells...

As this magazine goes to press we are rapidly approaching Daniel's last Sunday as our vicar. Everyone at All Saints would like to express their sincere thanks to Daniel and Angela Howard for all that they have contributed to the life of the church and the leadership that they have shown over the last nine years.

One of their early initiatives was starting the cots2tots group for young children with their parents and carers. Over the years many children have attended, friendships formed, lots of cake has been eaten and support given when challenges have arisen. Some families have wanted closer links with the church and brought their children for Baptism. Sunday groups (Sparklers, Comets and Rockets) and midweek groups (Impact and Abide) have run which have helped the children and young people to understand the Bible and grow in their Christian faith.

Angela and Daniel undertook much of the initial fund raising to support cots2tots and the work amongst families. This enabled us to employ Anna Leadbetter as our Families Worker. Anna, supported by her husband Owen, has made significant contributions to the success of the work with children and families and the development of our church. At the end of July Anna is leaving All Saints to take up new role at Holy Trinity, Poulton Lancelyn. We thank God for the work that Anna and Owen have undertaken at All Saints, and ask His blessing on them and their two children as they move to Holy Trinity.



It has been good to welcome young families into the church. The all age sermons have made us all think and Daniel is to be congratulated on the way he has coped with the most unexpected responses from the young people and turned the most unlikely comments into positive Christian messages.


Daniel has run several Simply Christianity courses, he has worked with St Georges to run Lent and Autumn courses and both he and Angela have supported people both on a one to one basis and in Bible Study groups. Angela started the Coffee Plus group. The church celebrated when a group of young people and adults were confirmed, the first confirmation that had been held at All Saints for many years.

Daniel has visited the local care homes on a regular basis and has encouraged others to go along with him on these visits. He has also been a regular visitor to Thornton Hough primary school where he has taken assemblies. He has provided strong support to be reaved families and to the many couples that chose to get married at All Saints. He has maintained the strong ties with St George's and, more recently, *Three Churches Together*.

As a church he has led us to consider our GAP (Growth Action Plan) goals and to think about our Vision and Goals for the coming years. Service times have been changed and new service booklets produced. A beautiful but aging building and its grounds have provided their challenges.

In May we celebrated the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the church's consecration and we were pleased that Daniel, dressed as Sherlock Holmes, opened the fete on the village green. It was a special time when we all came together as a community, worked together and welcomed many people from the wider community to come and celebrate with us and to visit our lovely church to see the wonderful flowers in the flower festival.

Our thanks and best wishes go to Daniel and the Howard family. We thank God for all that they have achieved here and our prayers go with them all as they move on to new challenges. We shall miss them.



### Notes on the PCC meetings on 25<sup>th</sup> June 2018

With Daniel's resignation from the Parish from the end of July the first part of the evening was a Special PCC Meeting convened to transact business required by Section 11 of the Patronage (Benefices) Measure 1986.

Alice Jones was appointed as Chairman and Reverend Beth Glover, the Rural Dean for Wirral South Deanery was welcomed to the meeting.

The meeting noted that the Diocesan Director of Human Resources as Designated Officer had given notice of the vacancy. Patsy Baker and Alice Jones were appointed as Lay Representatives for the parish.

The vacancy will be advertised within the Diocese of Chester and it was decided to ask the Simeon's Trust (our patron) to advertise it as well. A meeting had been arranged for the following week when the Bishop of Birkenhead and the Reverend Canon Helen Edwards (the trustee from the Simeon's Trust) could meet with the PCC to explain the vacancy process.

The PCC heard that a straw poll taken at the open church meeting on 23<sup>rd</sup> June had voted overwhelmingly in favour of accepting either a man or a woman - whoever was the better candidate. In relation to the Priests (Ordination of Women) Measure 1993 the PCC took a vote and decided not to make a Letter of Request. (*This means that either a man or a woman could be appointed, maintaining the status quo.*)

We now need to complete the Parish Fact Sheet and write the Parish Profile. The PCC agreed that the Standing Committee should write a draft version of the Parish Profile then take it to the PCC for discussion.

Beth encouraged us all to pray for the church and for guidance in writing the parish profile and appointing a new vicar.

Daniel then joined us and we continued with the regular business of the PCC.

After comments made by a member of the congregation it was agreed that the *Membership List* should be renamed *Contact List*. Iain Stinson agreed to check the legitimacy of this with the Information Commissioner's Office and revised forms would be available for people who had still not filled them in.

The PCC are continuing to monitor the maintenance of the New Graveyard and are obtaining comparable quotes from different contractors.

Owen Leadbetter resigned from the PCC from 24<sup>Th</sup> June 2018. He was also stepping down from the Fabric and Health and Safety Team after their next meeting in July. The members of the PCC are very grateful for all that Owen has done.

There are now two vacancies on the PCC. Two former PCC members have indicated their willingness to serve again. This will be followed up at the next PCC meeting.

Daniel thanked Anna for her 5 years service as Families Worker and wished her well in her new role at Holy Trinity, Poulton Lancelyn.

It was agreed that we need to try to continue the children's work on a Sunday; the volunteers (Linda Arch, Margaret Wignall, Rhona Mayhew, Judy Cook, Cath Arnold and Lesley Morris) have agreed to continue. As numbers are small it has been decided to combine the children into one group.

It was also hoped that cots2tots could continue as there was a shortage of volunteers and a decision was needed as soon as possible. Sue Stinson agreed to help, going on the rota to help at the sessions and helping with the administration and organisation of the craft. Rachel Brothwell volunteered to take on the overall management of the group; she has qualifications and experience in working with young children. The PCC accepted her offer and thanked her for volunteering.

The PCC was very grateful that Linda Arch had offered to be the Parish Safeguarding Officer. The Diocese run training programmes for safeguarding officers.



A finance report had been circulated to the PCC in advance of the meeting. The PCC approved the use of online banking for the HSBC accounts and changes to the signatories on the bank accounts, needed due to resignations.

The Fabric Team reported that repairs have been carried out to the floor in the Parish Hall, the gates onto the patio from Church Road have been mended and the handle on the church door has been replaced. An evacuation plan is still being worked on and they are also continuing to do regular maintenance checks.

Ellly reported that the electoral roll now stands at 146 due to the death of Ithell Francis

### Finding a new vicar

Following Daniel's resignation as our vicar, the process has begun to find his successor. We thought readers of the Magazine might be interested to know what the main steps are which will take place to enable a new vicar being appointed for All Saints.

The appointment of a new vicar is made by the Bishop of Chester on the recommendation of the patron of the parish. The patron is responsible for finding a suitable candidate for the post and works with the parish (through the PCC) and representatives of the Deanery and the Diocese.

The Deanery is a group of (Church of England) churches in the same geographic area who loosely work together under the leadership of the Rural Dean. Our Deanery, known as Wirral South, has 13 parishes and our Rural Dean is Rev'd. Beth Glover, who is vicar of St Mary's Eastham. There are 18 deaneries in the Diocese of Chester and they are more manageable sub groups of the Diocese.

The patron of a parish can be an individual, a particular office holder or an organisation and some parishes have more than one patron. The patron for All Saints Thornton Hough is Simeon's Trust.

The Parochial Church Council (PCC) is elected by the members of the congregation to help run All Saints and whilst a new vicar is being sought, they, led by the two elected churchwardens, are responsible for the continued running of All Saints. They also play an important part in the search for the new vicar.

The Diocese has officially notified us that Daniel is leaving and a series of meetings of has taken place to initiate the recruitment process.

On Saturday June 23<sup>rd</sup> there was an open meeting for members of All Saints to discuss the appointment of a new vicar and to provide input to the PCC on what they thought were important points to be considered.

A special PCC meeting was held on June 25<sup>th</sup> when a number of formal agenda items were considered and voted upon. This is reported on elsewhere in this edition of The Magazine.

Another special PCC meeting was held on Thursday July 5<sup>th</sup> with the Bishop of Birkenhead, Bishop Keith, and the Rev'd. Canon Helen Edwards who is the representative of Simeon's Trust. Helen will be working with us during the processes of finding a new vicar; she described the process that would be followed and the role Simeon's Trust would have in that role.

We were reminded that the process is one governed by Canon Law but were assured that we would be guided through the process by Simeon's Trust and the Diocese. Once the interviews are complete and the interview panel unanimously agree who to appoint, then the patron, Simeon's Trust, will present the candidate to the Bishop of Chester who will then, if he is satisfied with the recommended appointment, formally make the appointment.

As you would expect, the interview and final steps in making the appointment are confidential and only at an agreed time can the outcome be announced publically. Following the public announcement of the identity of the new vicar, it is likely that it will be a further three months before they take up the post at All Saints.

We would encourage everyone to pray regularly that suitable candidates apply for the post and All Saints and that the best person for the job is appointed as our next vicar.

Bishop Keith and Helen led an interesting discussion with the PCC members present helping to draw out what was important for All Saints going forward and how this might influence the choice of a new vicar. We were encouraged to pray regularly that the right candidate would be found for All Saints. We discuss ed the drawing up of the parish profile and the completion of the Parish Fact Sheet.

Follow this meeting the PCC Secretary, on behalf of the PCC, completed a form which has been sent to the Diocese; this is an important step which has to be completed before the search can begin.

The PCC has to produce two documents which set out what our church is like and our vision for the future. These documents are presently being drafted and will need to be agreed by the PCC before being made available to those enquiring about the post at All Saints.

One of these documents, the Parish Fact Sheet gives factual details about the state of the parish. It includes a summary of our services and other activities, the attendance at services and other events, details about the area, the financial state of the parish, our vision for the future and so on.



The other document, The Parish Profile, is a longer document which gives more details for those who may be interested in the post. It includes details about the local area (its attractions and facilities), the local community, a brief history of the church, the worshiping life of the church, church organisations, church buildings and their condition, a summary of our financial resources, our links with other parishes and ecumenical links, our involvement with home and overseas mission, details of the vicarage, some statistical information and our vision for the future which we want to share with the next vicar.

When these two documents are completed and approved by the PCC (after review by Bishop Keith and Canon Helen) the post will be advertised. Initially the adverts will appear on the Diocesan and Simeon's Trust websites and the Church of England recruitment website known as *pathways* 

(https://pathways.churchofengland.org). Both the Bishop and Simeon's Trust may also direct suitable, potential candidates they know to consider the post at All Saints.

Simeon's Trust will manage the initial stages of the recruitment process, sending out details to those interested and answering basic queries about the post. They will make the preparations for a short-listing meeting when the list of those candidates to be interviewed is drawn up. The two parish representatives, Patsy and Alice, will take part in this process.


Once a short list has been drawn up interviews will take place (at All Saints). The interview panel will be the two parish representatives, the Simeon's Trust representative, Rev'd Canon Helen Edwards, the Rural Dean, Rev'd Beth Glover, and representatives of the Diocese (Bishop Keith and the Archdeacon). Before the formal interviews the candidates invited for interview will want to see the church and the vicarage and this will be arranged. There will also be a chance for the candidates to meet and talk with some members of the congregation. The formal interview will include a presentation or discussion led by each candidate.



#### What is the Simeon's Trust?

Simeon's Trust and Hyndman's Trust are leading and long-standing Church of England patronage trusts, with patronage interests in nearly 200 parishes in over 40 dioceses, often as sole patron. As patrons, they work with parishes and dioceses to find the best and most appropriate person to be appointed as the vicar of one of their parishes.





Charles Simeon (1759-1836), Vicar of Holy Trinity Cambridge for 54 years, was John contemporary of Wesley, William Wilberforce, a founder member of the Church Mission Society and an early supporter of the British and Foreign Bible Society. Simeon and a number of his contemporaries were concerned to ensure gospel ministry flourished in the Church of England. Partly as a result of Simeon's ministry and influence in Cambridge and beyond, a considerable number of men

were ordained but they then found it difficult to find livings. Many of the bishops and private patrons would not appoint them because of their emphasis on personal faith.

During most of the 19<sup>th</sup> century, vicars were mainly appointed by patrons – individuals or bodies that held the right to do so. Often the criteria and methods of appointment fell short of what we would see as spiritual and vocational essentials. Until 1898, the right of a patron to appoint a vicar was legally a piece of property which could be bought and sold.

Charles Simeon used his family wealth to buy such rights, often in strategic places such as town and city centre parishes. To continue his patronage work on gospel principles. Simeon established a Trust. Simeon and his trustees put the needs of the parish foremost when making decisions about who to appoint to livings. Unlike many other patrons of the time their motivation was spiritual, seeking to appoint men who were not only able but the most appropriate for the parish.

In 1833 Simeon gave a charge to his Trustees about appointing vicars. This continues to underpin the work of the Trustees though it has been re-interpreted somewhat as now both women and men are appointed to Simeon livings.

Important points in this charge include

appointing persons

- who are devoted, who are of God in deed and in truth;
- who combine solid judgment and an independent mind;

### when appointing

- to consider nothing but the welfare of the people in the parish;
- not to be influenced by the great and powerful;
- to consider how well the person is suited to the parish.

Hyndman's Trust was brought together with Simeon's in 1990. The trusts are generally thought of as representing the evangelical tradition in the Church of England, but Simeon's Charge does not set out a 'party' position, and they have patronage interests in parishes in a range of traditions, which they respect.

Their main role is when a benefice (parish) is in vacancy, working with PCCs, Dioceses and other patrons, towards the appointment of a new minister. However, in addition to involvement at other key times, they give ongoing prayer support for their parishes and clergy.

Twenty people were present to hear about his chosen subject : -

### "The importance of the fork, which is not as stirring as the spoon."

I was pleased to accept an invitation to speak to the June meeting of the ACF. Eileen asked me for a title for my talk and I offered the above, which certainly deserves an explanation. It comes from our time living in Sarasota, Florida, and from various tours throughout the USA.

Most Americans start a main meal course by cutting up the meat content and placing the knife to one side and finishing the meal with just the fork. If I had taken a little more time to choose a fitting title I should have used words that suit my age and failing memory, such as "I wish my memory was as good as my knowledge deserves."

My talk is based on the many years we have been able and privileged to live in the United States and see more of our families who live and work there. Daughter Kathryn has worked there since the early 1990s and lives in Sarasota. We found it so easy to settle there and have come to love and respect the American people. Their churches are beacons of life and light and we became part of their fellowship, which continues today with many special contacts.

Driving on the 'wrong' side of the road was a quick learning process and passing a driving test was a requirement to gain cheaper insurance as a genuine resident. Observing other driving habits was a good idea, with some reservations. Meshing in was a suitable plan. The safety of school buses with their Stop signs, which stop all traffic in the vicinity, makes it safe for all children. Early impressions are fed by space. The space for bigger homes, roads, cars, schools, stores, sports stadia and National Parks.

Having secured a home there, our first quest was to find a church. There are many denominations and we found the closest, 'The Church of the Nativity', part of the Episcopal Church of America. This is like our Anglican church, with similar prayer and hymn books. Initially it was just a wooden building — to become their future Church Hall, once the new church was built. We fitted in quickly and became part of their fellowship which was so loving.



We became part of their desire to see the new church built and joined in all the events that took place and witnessed the building of the church over our first two years there. It was a special time with special people to achieve such a spiritual event. The first year of occupation found us arranging an English flower festival to commemorate the new House of God. They still continue to have flower festivals every year.

The friends we made are still in contact and share various articles of faith and fun from time to time. The story of the little boy who wanted to meet God is an example. He set off with a packed case of crisps and drinks. He walked through the park and sat on a bench next to an elderly lady. He started his snack and noticed that the lady looked hungry. They smiled at each other as they shared his snack. No words were spoken. The boy realised it was getting late and started to leave. After a few steps he ran back and gave her a big hug. In return she gave him a beautiful smile. When he got home his mother asked him what was making him look so happy. He replied: "I had lunch with God today" and he added: "She's got the most beautiful smile I've ever seen." When the lady got home her son noticed her look of peace and she explained: "I ate crisps in the park with God today." She added: "You know, he's much younger than I expected." God does move in mysterious ways and he is in people we meet if we care to look. To look with open expectancy. To notice friendship and fellowship that we too may share something of our lives in everyday occurrences.

A regular weekly healing service in our church was followed by a small team of ladies, plus myself, meeting in the church hall. We were known as the Bandage Brigade. We collected laundered bed sheets that were no longer fit for use in the hospital, tore them into 3" strips, stitched them into 20' lengths and then rolled them as bandages. They were sent to a Haiti children's hospital with clothing. After our efforts we went to a local restaurant for lunch. One day the restaurant owner, seeing me with 11 ladies, asked me what my secret was, dining with such a lovely group of ladies. I advised him that I was their probation officer!

### **POULTON HALL GARDENS GO WILD**

On Saturday July 14th from 2 to 5 pm Poulton Hall Gardens were open to the public in aid of the Cheshire Wildlife Trust. The walled gardens were spectacular as ever, despite the drought. But this time the wildlife volunteers and gardeners were keen to interest visitors in birds, bees and butterflies, and how to help them.





The wildflower meadow, with its four copses, is surrounded by 400 metres of nine species hedgerow - one species for each hundred years the Lancelyn Greens have lived here. Visitors were issued pictures of hawthorn, blackthorn, dog-rose, guelder rose, alder, hazel, oak, beech and holly to be able to recognise them. There were also sheets to show which wildflowers were still in bloom, and how to recognise the butterflies which were out and about in abundance.

The Wildlife volunteers worked very hard, managing the car-parking, demonstrating hedge-laying and entertaining children. When they needed refreshment, along with everyone else they were served by the Rotary Club of Neston. Nigel Brierley brought a fine display of bee-keeping, with bees in a see-through hive, honeys and wax products.





Andy from Cheshire Falconry displayed 6 birds of prey. Star of the show was a magnificent white tailed eagle, but there was also the most delightful little barn owl.

### POETRY CORNER THE GARDEN Andrew Marvell

What wondrous life is this I lead! Ripe apples drop about my head; The luscious clusters of the vine Upon my mouth do crush their wine; The nectarine and curious peach. Into my hands themselves do reach; Stumbling on melons as I pass, Ensnared with flowers I fall on grass.

Meanwhile the mind, from pleasure less, Withdraws into its happiness; The mind, that ocean where each kind Does straight its own resemblance find, Yet it creates, transcending these, Far other worlds, and other seas; Annihilating all that's made To a green thought in a green shade.

Here at the fountain's sliding foot, Or at some fruit tree's mossy root, Casting the body's vest aside, My soul into the boughs does glide; There like a bird it sits and sings, Then whets, and combs its silver wings; And, till prepared for longer flight, Waves in its plumes the various light.

Such was that happy garden-state, While man there walked without a mate; After a place so pure and sweet, What other help could yet be meet! But 'twas beyond a mortal's share To wander solitary there: Two paradises 'twere in one to live in paradise alone.

These are the 5th to 8th verses of a nine verse poem. I've collapsed the lines to save space, so you need to read it rather slowly to get the full effect. The other verses suggest it was written as a compliment to the recently retired commander of Oliver Cromwell's New Model Army, Sir Thomas Fairfax, whose daughter Marvell tutored during 1650 and 1651 and whose gardens he obviously enjoyed.

They are beautifully written, rhyming, scanning, full of loveliness and longing.

Andrew Marvell (1621-1678) was something of a prodigy. He went up to Trinity College Cambridge at 12, published Greek and Latin poetry aged 16 and graduated at 18. He clearly had great facility with language, rapidly learning Italian, Spanish, French and Dutch while travelling on the continent in the 1640's, (thus avoiding most of the Civil War, which ended in 1651).


His most famous poem is probably *To His Coy Mistress* - "Had we but world enough and time This coyness, Lady, were no crime" in which he tries to seduce a virgin and there is just a slight possibility that he might succeed, but his love poetry never sounds satisfied (as Donne's does, for example). In *The Mower's Song* when his mistress comes she tramples on his feelings, she: "What I do to the grass, does to my thoughts and me" and in his *Definition of Love* his notion of true love is by definition unachievable, though he sounds rather proud of it: "My love is of a birth as rare As 'tis for object strange and high; It was begotten by Despair Upon Impossibility."

In *The Garden* we gain some insight into Marvell's failure to marry, or even have a mistress (so far as anyone knows. The known facts of his life are a bit sketchy.) There is the sensuous delight and joyful tumbling among the fruit, with the "luscious clusters of the vine" and bondage - "ensnared with flowers" - falling, but softly onto grass. This sounds splendidly worldly and indulgent, but then he starts thinking, and this is a much more enjoyable activity. Marvell's mind is an ocean (Ted Hughes's "has mountains") and it is imaginative and creative. He likes his own company.

I do find the ocean metaphor rather difficult to understand. The famous critic Sir Christopher Ricks calls this sort of comparison "short-circuited". Here the mind is compared to an ocean in which everything (presumably fishy) can immediately recognise itself in another. It can also imagine all manner of other worlds and seas, while at the same time: "Annihilating all that's made To a green thought in a green shade". Simple words but they convey a wealth of meaning.

In the *Dialogue Between the Soul and the Body* the soul imprisoned in its body complains that it "fettered stands In feet, and manacled with hands" while the body complains of "this tyrannic soul". In *The Garden* the soul simply divests itself of the body and flies off like a bird whose silver wings reflect the "various light". Marvell was a politically active poet, MP for his birthplace Hull for 18 years, and his poems weren't published till after his tragically early death because many of them were dangerously political. His best work really defies prose explanation. Read *The Garden* aloud if possible. It's quite sad in a way.

#### **COOKERY CORNER**

#### **SAUSAGE AND CHILLI PASTA**

300 gm dried pasta, Olive oil

1 onion chopped and chopped garlic (optional)

1 lb sausage meat or skinned sausages

Small fresh chilli finely chopped and fresh chopped herbs if desired.

2 tbsps soured cream or yoghurt

200 gms baby spinach leaves



Heat the olive oil in a separate pan and cook the onion till soft, then add the chopped chilli.

Cut the sausage meat into small chunks and cook with the onion for 10 mins or until cooked.

Drain the pasta and combine with the sausage mixture.

Stir in the spinach and soured cream, heat through, season and serve.

#### REDCURRANT FOOL

Half pound redcurrants or soft fruit of choice 100 mls double cream 100 mls greek yoghurt Sugar

Gently simmer fruit (in very small amount of water if necessary) till softened

Put through a sieve ( or blitz to a pureé if using fruit with no seeds) Sweeten to taste

Leave to cool

Whisk the cream till thickened ,but not too firm.

Blend with the yogurt and fold in the sweetened fruit pureé
