A letter from the Vicar

I have been deeply moved by the welcome which so many people have given me as I join you as Vicar of All Saints'. Cards, flowers, cakes, friendly greetings and a willingness to tolerate me when I make mistakes, are all ways in which I have been made to feel at home both in church and in the wider village community. Your hospitality has been wonderful.



Jesus tells his disciples: "For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in" (Matthew 25:35).

But do we become so busy in being the ones offering the love shown in shelter, the food and drink that we ignore our own need to be loved: sheltered, fed and watered, both physically and mentally?

The Dutch Catholic priest Henri Nouwen found his life changed when he visited his friend Jean Vanier at the L'Arche community in France and his sense of what welcome means was transformed. L'Arche is home to individuals with different and often complex learning needs. Nouwen had been pursuing a high-flying, pressurised academic career which meant that he was internationally in demand as a speaker. The man who was used to giving so much to others found himself utterly burnt out.

However, surrounded by individuals who simply loved having him with them and asked for nothing in return, Henri Nouwen reflected on what giving and receiving welcome really means:

It is difficult not to have plans, not to organize people around an urgent cause, and not to feel that you are working directly for social progress. But I wonder more and more if the first thing shouldn't be to know people by name, to eat and drink with them, to listen to their stories and tell your own and to let them know with words, handshakes, and hugs that you do not simply like them, but you truly love them."

How do we give and receive those marks of welcome? How can we be more attentive to one another and see Christ in each person we meet?

Installation of our new Vicar 16th May 2019

Revd Vicky Barrett was installed as the Vicar of All Saints Church Thornton Hough on Thursday 16th May 2019, in a service led by the Bishop of Birkenhead -Bishop Keith, supported by Revd Canon Gordon Welch (acting for the Rural Dean) and neighbouring clergy.





The church was full with members of Vicky's family and her friends, clergy, invited guests, members of Bunbury Church and members of All Saints.



The service began with a procession down the aisle led by the All Saints Church Choir followed by the visiting clergy, Vicky as the incumbent designate, Rural Dean, Churchwardens and the Bishop.

In attendance was The Revd Canon Helen Edwards, representing the Simeon's Trustees - the Patrons of All Saints. Canon Edwards presented Vicky to the Bishop to be installed as the incumbent at All Saints. There followed the declaration of Assent and the swearing of the Oath of Allegiance to the Queen and the Oath of Canonical Obedience to the Bishop Of Chester.





Bishop Keith then led Vicky to the main door of the church where she was inducted into All Saints. Vicky then tolled the bell to signify that she had been inducted. She was then led back to the incumbent 's stall and she was installed as the incumbent which was greeted by enthusiastic clapping.

The service continued with an Act of Dedication. Vicky was presented with water at the font, a Bible at the pulpit and bread and wine at the altar by members of the congregation. Following this, Vicky was presented to the congregation as the new Vicar of All Saints by Revd Gordon Welch and was enthusiastically greeted by all. Vicky was introduced to the Churchwardens first and then was warmly welcomed by Canon Edwards to her new position of Vicar of All Saints Thornton Hough. She was then welcomed by Revd Canon Jeremy Dussek representing Chester Cathedral and Mrs Liz Geddes representing the Chester Diocese. Following this, Vicky was introduced to members of the Parish with whom she would have close contact and they welcomed her:-

the Headteacher of the Primary School Miss Alison Kershaw; the Secretary of the Community Trust Mrs Karen Young; Ann McTigue from the WI, John Lewis Secretary of Wirral South Deanery, Jeremy Stephens from Charles Stephens Undertakers and Mark Mitchell who organises the Men's Breakfast Group.

This was a wonderful service full of joy and happiness with enthusiastic singing of the hymns selected by Vicky and led by the Choir under the leadership of lain Stinson. The reading from Ecclesiastes was also selected by Vicky. The service ended with everyone processing out after singing the wonderful and appropriate hymn "Guide me O thou great Redeemer".



Following the service everybody was invited to have the enticing refreshments in the Parish Hall. This gave an opportunity for people to talk to Vicky.

Notes on the annual meetings and the PCC meeting after the annual meetings on Sunday April 28th 2019

The meetings came at the end of a period of interregnum. A message from Revd Vicky Barrett was read out at the beginning of the first meeting:

Greetings to all the Saints of All Saints', Thornton Hough!

I hope you all enjoyed a happy Easter Sunday and remain full of joy in this Easter season - alleluia.

I shall be thinking of you and praying as you hold the Annual Parish Church Meeting.

The Annual Report shows that, amongst all the challenges which you have faced in the last year, there is much to give thanks for in the life and work of the church. Thank you all for what you have done to make this so.

Thanks to Patsy and Alice for their tireless work and energy as churchwardens, and to Iain and Sue Stinson as Director of Music, Treasurer and Secretary.

I am looking forward to meeting you at my institution on 16th May and to the adventures we will have as the Holy Spirit leads us in this parish, sharing the gospel and living for the glory of God.

The church was looking forward to welcoming Vicky at her Installation and Induction service on Thursday 16th May.

Annual Meeting of Parishioners

Patsy Baker and Alice Jones were elected as churchwardens for the coming year and thanked for all that they had done during the past year.

Annual Parochial Church Meeting

The Financial Report for 2018 and the Annual Report for 2018 had been circulated in advance of the meeting.

The Financial Report was commented on by the Treasurer, Iain Stinson.

We managed to balance the books in 2018. A major contributing factor was that we no longer employ a Families Worker. Iain expressed his thanks to the people who had worked hard to keep the finances in the black at the end of the year and prevent the expenditure exceeding the income.

lain expressed his thanks to the team who count the money each week which saves him a lot of time and means that the counting is independent of the treasurer. He also emphasised that payments are authorised by the other signatories to the bank accounts; when his salary (as Director of Music) is paid the payment is currently authorised by either Brian Morris or Darren Jones.

lain expressed his thanks to Rob Backhouse, the independent examiner who examines the accounts each year.

Our investments are managed by the Diocesan Board of Finance. The income from these has dropped in recent years. At one time they contributed approximately £25,000 per annum to our income but now generate only around £18,000 per annum. They are an important source of income for All Saints. The value of the investments has dropped by about £36,000 at the moment due to the current turbulent state of the financial markets. This would only be of concern if we were to want to sell them. Iain will write to the Diocese to ask why the investments are performing poorly (when other funds appear to be performing better) and will report back to the PCC.

We already appear to be heading for a deficit this year, unless we are able to generate more income.

There were no questions about the report, and it was accepted by the meeting.

Electoral Roll.

There has been a complete revision of the electoral roll in 2019. There were 94 on the electoral roll on the day of the meeting.

Report on the fabric, goods and ornaments.

There was nothing to add to the statement in the Annual Report for 2018. Darren Jones and the Fabric and Health and Safety Team were thanked for all they do.

Report on the Deanery Synod.

There were no questions about the Deanery Synod report. Elly Macbeath and Bill Brennan are the Deanery Synod representatives.

Elections and Appointments

Due to the number on the electoral roll falling below 100 we can now have only 9 elected representatives on the PCC.

Four members were up for re-election this year and there were 4 spaces available. Nomination forms had been received for Godfrey Allan Price, Sydney Deakin, Margaret Gamble, Di Hughes and Lucinda Russell. Alice Jones said that anyone not elected could be co-opted onto the PCC for 1 year. Godfrey Allan Price said that he was prepared to be co-opted for a year. It was proposed that the other 4 members should be re-elected for a further 3 years. This was accepted by the meeting.

Appointment of Sidespersons.

Alice Jones emphasised how important is the role of a sidesperson. To be a sidesperson it is necessary to be on the electoral roll. The meeting agreed that the list of sidespersons should continue as it is for now.

Appointment of the Independent Examiner.

It was proposed and agreed that Rod Backhouse should be appointed as the Independent Examiner (for the PCC's finances).

Archdeacon's Visitation Service. This will be on Thursday 23rd May 2019 at 7:30pm at St James, Ince. The Churchwardens must attend a visitation service and all sidespersons were also encouraged to attend; the churchwardens appreciate their support. People were asked to let Patsy and Alice know if anyone needed assistance with making their way there.

Any other parochial or church interest matters. No other matters were discussed.

The meeting closed at 12:01pm.

Everyone is invited to enter any number of photographs. Photographs should be taken around Thornton Hough, Raby, Raby Mere and Brimstage. If possible we want photographs which cover all the seasons of the year so that the illustrations for each month can be appropriate to the season. Any people included on the photograph must not be identifiable. The photograph should be well composed and suitable for hanging on someone else's wall!

You may have photographs you have taken in the last few years which you want to enter and this is perfectly acceptable.

The photograph must have been taken by the entrant. The entrant can retain the copyright to the image but in entering the image into the competition must agree that All Saints Thornton Hough may use the image without any charge in its publications or on its website providing copyright is acknowledged.

Digital photographs taken on most modern phones, tablets and digital cameras will be suitable. Black and white photographs as well as coloured photographs will be accepted. [For the technically minded: the photographs should be a minimum size of 2500 x 3500 pixels (6 MP). The photographs should be submitted in JPEG or TIFF format, with no or minimal compression to preserve image quality. Digital manipulation should be limited to minor adjustments and cropping.]

Prints from film cameras may also be submitted; they must be at least 6 x 8 inches (152 x 203 mm) and unmounted.

The deadline for entries into the competition is **31st July 2019.** This will allow sufficient time for the calendar to be created and printed and we would expect the calendar to be on sale towards the end of September. The "winners" will be notified as soon as possible.

How to submit your entry:

By email: Send the image as a JPEG (jpg) attachment to

photos@allsaintsth.org.uk; you should include your name and contact details in the email message. We shall send you an acknowledgement to say that we have received your entry. Most smart phones include facilities to allow you to do this. Always select the maximum file size (highest quality option) that you are given when sending directly from your phone or tablet.

On a memory stick: put the image as a JPEG or TIFF file on an otherwise empty USB memory stick; write your name and contact details on a piece of paper and place this along with the memory stick in a sealed envelope and hand it to one of The Magazine editorial team. Your entry will be copied from the memory stick and the memory stick returned to you.

Prints from film cameras: Place the photograph in a suitable envelope, include a piece of paper with your name and contact details in the envelope and pass the sealed envelope to one of The Magazine editorial team. Your entry will be scanned and the original photograph returned to you.

Fellowship Meetings Reports

Our speaker in April was the **Revd Dr Nick Jones** from St George's Church. The theme of his talk was "**Resurrection**" and the chosen reading was from :-

 $1 Peter Ch 1 v_3 - 9$ - The living hope given to us as new birth through the resurrection. We were reminded that Jesus's death made this complete.

Luke, the meticulous historian, records the facts which are the bedrock of the faith. The stone rolled away, the body gone and the angels appear to say why.

"The cross and resurrection are the lynchpins of history. Human life has been invaded by the Life of God, death is no longer the final reality. There is confidence for the future and the church has good news to proclaim"

Quote from Scripture Union Reading on Easter Sunday.

Dr Jones had put a lot of thought into his talk and we were each given a selection of verses from hymns relevant to Easter. We managed on the whole to identify the source and author.

Some time was given to poetry, several volumes of which were available — one a hundred years old! The poets and hymn writers featured included works by *Robert Bridges, Gerard Manly Hopkins, George Herbert, Isaac Watts* and *Charles Wesley.*

This was a very inspiring and thoughtful presentation from Nick and different to
all other talks.17 people were present.

The meeting in May, attended by 15 people, was an Alzheimer workshop presented by Ben and Lucy from

"Home Instead Senior Care Wirral"

The PowerPoint presentation gave an insight into the condition of 4 people at various stages of how it affects their lives. Relatives also spoke about their experiences.





There was plenty of advice on how to cope with dementia for carers and relatives and where to get assistance. The first stage involves the GP who gives initial memory tests and if indicated will refer the patient to the specialised memory clinic where a detailed assessment and diagnosis will be given.

Alzheimer / Dementia is a progressive deteriorating neurological condition.

"*Home Instead*" provides care in 1 hour slots, the same carer each time to avoid further confusion to an already mixed up person. The care can include companionship, planning and preparing meals, medication reminders, light housekeeping, running errands and helping with daily living routines.

May 20th—24th is "Dementia Awareness Week".

everyone who contributed and worked so hard to realise this important asset for the use of the whole village community: residents, sportsmen and women who use the Green, walkers and anyone in need.

Since this special event, CPR training was held at the Institute on Sunday, 12 May, for representatives from the local churches, the Community Trust and the WI. Nick Blair gave a most entertaining and instructive demonstration of CPR (Cardiopulmonary resuscitation)



and how to use the defibrillator. It is hoped that we will be able to arrange a further training session in the near future.


At our meeting on Tuesday, 4 June, Derek Arnold will present 'Battle of the Atlantic' – visitors are very welcome.

Cookery Corner

Heather's fruit Cake

- 200gm raisins 200gm Sultanas 200gm currants 150gm glace Cherries 1 cup of brown sugar—tightly packed 125 gm butter or Margarine 1/2 cup of sherry or apple juice Place in a saucepan on a low heat and stir until boiling Then simmer for 3 minutes and allow to cool to room Temperature. Then add:-2 beaten eggs 1 cup plain flour
- 1 cup self raising flour

1 teaspoon mix spice.

Place all the mixture in a 1 kg (or 2 lbs) loaf tin and place in as moderate oven for 1 3/4 to 2 hours. Once cooked place on a wire tray to cool and cover with a tea towel until cool.

BURGUNDY LAMB

4oz bacon	1 medium onion		
1 clove garlic	1 1/2 lbs lamb shoulder		
1 medium carrot	1 tablespoon tomato purée		
4oz button mushroo	ms		
3/4 pint red wine	Salt and pepper		
1 teaspoon sugar	1 tablespoon flour		

Fry the chopped bacon in deep frying pan until crisp.

Remove from pan.

Fry the sliced onion and crushed garlic in the bacon fat until golden brown.

Cut the lamb into 1 inch cubes and add to the onion and sliced carrot.

Fry for 10 to 15 mins until meat is browned on all sides.

Return bacon to pan with the tomato purée, mushrooms, red wine, salt, pepper, sugar and flour. Bring to boil. Place in a large casserole and bake at 180 C 350 F Gas 4 for 1 1/2 hrs.


