Bible Readings

Acts 19:1-7

While Apollos was at Corinth, Paul took the road through the interior and arrived at Ephesus. There he found some disciples and asked them, 'Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you believed?'

They answered, 'No, we have not even heard that there is a Holy Spirit.'

So Paul asked, 'Then what baptism did you receive?'

'John's baptism,' they replied.

Paul said, 'John's baptism was a baptism of repentance. He told the people to believe in the one coming after him, that is, in Jesus.' On hearing this, they were baptised in the name of the Lord Jesus. When Paul placed his hands on them, the Holy Spirit came on them, and they spoke in tongues and prophesied. There were about twelve men in all.

Mark 1:4-11

And so John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness, preaching a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. The whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem went out to him. Confessing their sins, they were baptised by him in the River Jordan. John wore clothing made of camel's hair, with a leather belt round his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. And this was his message: 'After me comes the one more powerful than I, the straps of whose sandals I am not worthy to stoop down and untie. I baptise you with water, but he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit.'

At that time Jesus came from Nazareth in Galilee and was baptised by John in the Jordan. Just as Jesus was coming up out of the water, he saw heaven being torn open and the Spirit descending on him like a dove. And a voice came from heaven: 'You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased.'

Reflection: New life!

Water: a powerful symbol of life, that which sustains us all, from the most powerful humans on the planet to the very earth on which we stand. But it is also a symbol of death: sinking beneath the waves, being swallowed up in its depths. We wash ourselves in it, never perhaps more so than at the moment when we are so acutely conscious of the risk of viral infection, cleaning even where we cannot see any dirt.

Water is the symbol we use at baptism. In and of itself, it is just H₂0, but it reminds us of a greater promise. John the Baptist told the crowds who came to

him at the banks of the River Jordan that 'I baptise you with water, but he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit.'

The baptism of John was a way of getting people ready: think of it as we might wash our hands in preparation for a meal. He reminded people that they needed to look carefully at their lives and get rid of all that was holding them back from following God: to turn to a right relationship with him and other people.

But something special happened at the Jordan when Jesus arrived. Fully embracing his humanity, Jesus came to be baptised by John, and at that point, heaven and earth were brought together, and a voice from heaven called out in joy: 'You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased.' Here God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit, seen in the form of a dove descending upon Jesus come together.

As we remember the baptism of Christ, we also remember and give thanks for our baptism into God's family. Being part of that family isn't something which we have earned; it is not a badge for good behaviour or a mark of us being somehow 'better' than someone else. This is grace: that God loves his creation so much that he allows his only Son to come and share our humanity, to die for our sins and to be raised from death to life for our sake. He sees our infinite worth and, in baptism, brings us to the start of a new life. He gives us the gift of his Holy Spirit, to comfort and guide us as we go on.

In this time when you may be feeling overwhelmed with the cares of the world, be assured of God's presence with you. The new life of baptism, the promise of God's Holy Spirit is here for you. It is a baptism we share with all Christians through the ages, and it builds us together as a church now. Even when our worship together is paused, we are not alone.

The Creed

We pray for our health and care workers: keep them safe in these dangerous times, and enable them to see your love at work. Thank you for those who continue to distribute food to shops and homes, for workers on checkouts and those who provide our public transport.

hear our prayer.

We pray for our leaders of local and national government. Grant them your wisdom and compassion as they carry out their offices. And as we see the events unfold in the United States, we pray for a safe transition to a new presidency. May your message of healing and reconciliation be brought to all people, that they may learn to live and work together so that all can thrive.

Lord, in your mercy,

hear our prayer.

You created a beautiful world for us to live in, yet it bears the scars of our abuse. The water necessary for healthy life is often polluted. We pray for wise stewardship of our natural resources, and a willingness for nations to work together to support the health of the most vulnerable people and places. May the creativity of scientists as they produce vaccines against coronavirus be used to protect all populations. As locusts threaten to eat the crops in parts of East Africa, we think of those whose lives are endangered not only by the coronavirus, but by famine and sudden natural disasters.

Lord, in your mercy,

hear our prayer.

We pray for our children and those who help them to learn — teachers and now parents engaged in home schooling. We ask for your protection for them: that they would be able to delight in finding out about the world in which they live and be filled with curiosity, and not fall prey to boredom, depression or apathy. Protect them from abuse: from cruelty encountered online or from suffering at home.

Lord, in your mercy,

hear our prayer.

We ask for your loving presence to be alongside all who are alone today. Comfort those who are suffering, in body, mind or soul. Give us the inspiration to keep in touch with people, to be generous with our time and to be part of that comfort.

Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

We give you thanks for those whom we have loved but see no more. We also commend to your love those who have died and are known only to you. Be with those who are mourning the loss of a loved one today – whether that loss is raw and recent, or longer ago. We trust them to your unending love.

We gather our thoughts in the Collect for this first Sunday after Epiphany:

Heavenly Father, at the Jordan you revealed Jesus as your Son: may we recognise him as our Lord and know ourselves to be your beloved children; through Christ our Saviour. Amen.

Let us pray with confidence as our Saviour has taught us:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread.
And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil.
For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever.
